NEW STUDENT HALL PASSES

Students received their 3rd 9 weeks hall passes during 1st period on Tuesday, January 9th. Students will have a set number of hall passes to use for 3rd 9 weeks' grading period, which ends on March 14th, 2024. Please talk to your student about the importance of being present in class, and returning to class in a timely manner.

DRESS CODE REMINDERS

As we return to school from the Winter Break, and the temperature continues to fluctuate, please keep the following LPSS dress code policies in mind:

No hoods are allowed on any garment at any time. Sweatshirts, quarter-zip jackets, and any outerwear that must be put on over the head must be one of the following approved SOLID colors:

• Black, Red, White, Gray, Navy, or PBMS Purple

Jackets that unzip ALL the way may be any color or any school appropriate design. However, they may NOT have a hood. Blankets are not allowed. No hats of any kind are permitted in the building and will be confiscated.

Students are not permitted to wear any facial adornments such as stickers or decorative acne patches, and may only wear band-aids on their face if they have an obvious injury

Hair color on all middle school students must occur NATURALLY on humans. Unnatural hair colors (ex: blue, purple, green, pink, orange, etc.) are not allowed.

Students may be sent home or to ISS depending on the time frame in which the dress code violation can be corrected. They may also receive a discipline referral depending on the severity and/or frequency of any dress code violations.

Parenting with Mark RESPONSIBILITY

As teens and adolescents, our kids spend a lot of their time gaining independence from us, and that is certainly an exercise in trust. Can you trust your child? Can you trust those with whom they interact? Building up responsibility as a way to gain trust will help you in a couple of ways. First, making responsibility about one's character instead of simply one's duties changes the narrative. Second, focusing on how responsibility builds trust allows for conversation around many topics, including expectations as well as hopes for future independence and additional responsibilities.

Sometimes our children will feel down, hopeless, or aimless. So how do you encourage responsibility, even when your child doesn't feel like doing anything? Well, the first thing is to talk about it. What things are motivating? What makes them feel stuck? Second, help them set a new horizon. If what they were working for now doesn't feel motivating, what can they set their eyes on in the future? How can you visually represent that in a way that can help motivate them to be responsible now so that they can have what they want later?

Questions for parents to consider:

- How do you establish trust with people?
- How do you establish trust with your child?
- How do your children see you follow through on your own responsibilities?

Questions to ask your child:

- When are you responsible?
- When do you struggle with motivation?
- How does responsibility show your character? How is it more than just carrying out duties?
- Why is motivation important?
